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

- Constitution changes allowing for Associate members to be registered now, ideal if you want to belong but no longer have an MX-5 or are planning on getting one.
- We have trialled a new communication system called "Discord" which makes online meetings and having attendees from around the country included nice and easy. We are looking at ways to use this platform as a private group for members and that work is underway now.
- A "mini national" is planned to be held in Taranaki on the first weekend of April 2022.

For the go faster brigade we are looking into organising other track days both on our own and in conjunction with other clubs with our goal of a couple per year spread around NZ.

Meantime membership is steadily increasing, as a team we are ticking off a few items in our quest to make things better than before and our club remains in a healthy position albeit some of us really feel the effects of lockdowns.

Stay safe, wave vigorously to all MX-5s out there and above all use and enjoy that MX-5. They truly are the best bubble to be in!

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WE WENT DOWN THE HOBBITON TRAIL

19 SEPTEMBER 2021

With the weather forecast looking real bad it was with some trepidation that we started off our Sunday morning with the intention of taking in some of the best roads in the south east Waikato area.

We had scoped out the run the Tuesday before and planned which were the best MX-5 roads to eventually end up in Matamata for lunch. At that point it was planned to disperse as a group through the many cafes in town because of Covid restrictions.

During our scoping run to check roads, and possible roadworks, and suitability for a group of Mazdas, we discovered we were right beside the Shires Rest, part of the Hobbiton complex.

This place is huge with a car park possibly bigger than most found at a Supermarket. Eerily, it was almost empty as was the big Cafe when we ventured inside. Six other people were enjoying lunch in a Cafe that conservatively could sit 200.

The decision was made there and then that this would be the place to stop for lunch on our run. We ordered our meals and very quickly they were served. They were big meals and well priced, so our decision to come back was a good one

Without overseas tourists this brilliant, internationally recognised tourist attraction is "bleeding". 360 staff is now down to 60 and the 9 large Hobbiton buses that ferry down the tourists to the Hobbiton Film Set are now sitting idle. Usually 1 bus leaves the Shires Rest fully laden every 10 minutes when at the peak of the tourist trade. While we were lunching there was 1 very small bus went down the short journey and we were at the Shires

boundary on Matangi Road where we regrouped.

First stop was the Lookout on Mangakawa Hill, sometimes referred to as Sanitorium Hill, located just south of Cambridge. What a spectacular view all over the Waikato from all points of the compass.

Sanitorium Hill used to be a Hospital for Tuberculosis patients who were convalescing. From 1902 up to 60 patients were housed in dormitories and single bed shelters. The Army took over the Sanitorium during WW1 for convalescing Servicemen. In 1922 it was sold and demolished as it was too expensive to maintain. All that remains today is one small outbuilding and many foundations where buildings used to be. Some of the old shelters were renovated and taken to Cambridge and the old Band Rotunda is now in the grounds of the Waikato Hospital.

Off we go again over glorious back roads and only overcast weather to end up at Hobbiton, which was even emptier of people than on our scoping run.


After a leisurely lunch break and many comments as to how huge the meals were, we set off to Matamata and parked at the Firth Tower museum. If you haven't been to this museum in the past it is well worth a visit.

Firth Tower museum occupies a remnant of the former Matamata estate (1865 to 1904) of some

56,000 acres established by Aucklander Josiah Clifton Firth.

As well as the 120 year old homestead and it's 1881 Tower this historic precinct preserves another dozen historic buildings in parklike surroundings.



Josiah Firth had the massive 13 metre 3 storey tower built in 1881 mainly as a status symbol so he could look over his extensive estate. Cost? £1600 or in today's money \$3200. It is one of the very earliest reinforced concrete buildings in NZ and is a category 1 listed building. One confusing aspect of this Tower is the numerous Gun Ports on all 3 levels. People can park Motorhomes in the grounds or the car park, for the princely sum of \$15 per night including power.

After a good look around we headed back to Hamilton and I hope our 15 car lineup was

impressive as we drove through the Main Street of Matamata.

Throughout our cruise the displays of literally hundreds of Cherry trees on the sides of the roads and in driveways was spectacular. Absolutely in full pink blossom.

We stopped at a point on Matangi road on the outskirts of Hamilton and had a good chat and said our goodbyes.

Some good feedback was given to us as to what members would like to do in future months:

- meet at a Cafe for a chat and meal
- mid-week runs
- dinner on a Friday night

16-17 October 2021

The Kapiti region has been going from strength to strength of late, so when Sharon proposed a run from the East coast to the West coast in one day to watch the sun rise and set, I'm sure she was blown away to have 28 cars with 53 MX-5ers on board. Even the sun gods came out to play on Saturday for our approx 460km marathon.

Everyone travelled at their leisure to Napier on the Friday before and stayed overnight at the Kennedy Park Resort. It was an excellent venue to cater for the numbers and had a bar area where those who wished to, gathered for a catch up.

Saturday morning we all met at 6.24am on Marine Parade in Napier to watch the sun come up over the ocean. It was truly magical.

Soon after we all made our way to Cafe Adoro for our pre-ordered breakfasts. Considering the numbers they were dealing with, it all seemed to run like clockwork. But hey I'm sure it's not every day that this little cafe in downtown Napier would get 53 hungry punters at 6.30am on a Saturday!

Back in the cars and we hit the road with full tanks and tops down with The Gentle Annie Highway in our immediate sights. Originally a Maori track but is now a fully sealed road with endless twists and turns, rolling farmland with numerous sheep and cattle stations, hillsides covered in native forests and superb scenery. Snow covered Mount Ruapehu kept teasingly coming into view as we snaked our way towards SH1, eventually popping out near Waiouru.





Across to Ohakune for a quick toilet, fuel or coffee stop then on to SH4 through National Park towards Taumaranui to the start of SH43 – The Forgotten World Highway.

Reputed to be the oldest heritage trail and one of the most scenic drives in NZ it is also rated by the police as one of the ten worst roads, due to the 12km slippery gravel section of the Tangarakau Gorge.

I'd say this was the most challenging section of the trip from a driver's perspective. We passed a field of lavenders and dense forest unique to the area as we made our way along the narrow winding road.

The single lane Moki Tunnel is affectionately known by the locals as 'The Hobbits Hole'. Built in the 1930's it is 180 metres long and was originally 5 metres high. However the floor was lowered in 1985 to accommodate the introduction of stock trucks and trailers. Did you all have time to look up at the amazing roof structure?

All the cars arrived at the Whangamomona Hotel covered in dust ready for the welcome pre-ordered lunch.

The staff of the Whangamomona Hotel did not disappoint with the lunch that they provided for our members. Savouries, sandwiches and scones (with the options of jam and cream) were made available along with coffee and tea. Some also chose to grab a refreshing beer from the well-stocked bar to wash down the trail dust of the last twenty or so kilometres, although many, aware of the driving yet to come, decided to wait until journey's end before indulging.

We departed the hospitality of the Republic of Whangamomona and headed off west along SH43 to Stratford; there we joined SH3 and continued to New Plymouth. Around about Normanby we encountered the first of several long stretches of roadworks, causing significant delays to our journeys. Once past Inglewood things sped up to something like normal highway conditions and we all arrived safely at Asure Abode Motel in New Plymouth in the mid-afternoon.

An informal Happy Hour took place in the communal courtyard of the motel; lots of chat about the day, the running gear of one or two of the more interesting cars (one word, quick), and a general catching up with each other. It's been observed that the group is attracting some younger enthusiasts in recent times; our club is taking on a more eclectic image these days which is good to see.

After Happy Hour most walked to the New Plymouth Club to see the sunset and have dinner. Early nights followed for many as it had been a longer day than some of us are used to these days.

On the Sunday morning the camp was mostly stirring by about 7-30 am; some of us headed off slightly in advance to get fuel on our way to breakfast; this was held at the Pukeiti Rain Forest Eatery which lived up to its name with a gentle drizzle slowly intensifying as we arrived top down.

Sharon had chosen a superb venue for breakfast, with the design and layout of the facility giving an impression to me of being in a giant tree house. At 7am I left Hamilton in rain and fog, hoping for better in the north. But first navigate the horrors of Auckland traffic on a Monday morning. Add nearly an hour to the expected time to Albany.

Lunch with friends in Kamo, and on through Opua and Paihia to Kerikeri. I called to see a friend at Quail Lodge Lifestyle Village. What a great way to live on the outskirts of Kerikeri.

North of Waipapa on SH10 I stopped at a picnic stop to be surrounded by the biggest, scariest roosters I have ever seen. After escaping "the mob" it was on through – Kaeo, Mangonui, Cable Bay, and Taipa – to Coopers Beach where I stayed with friends. A magnificent home overlooking the Bay.

Next morning the curtains were opened to a cloudy, windy day, but no rain. It was off north to Awanui and a right turn on to SH1. At Waipapakauri, near the Tavern, there is a mounted aircraft propeller, in memory of the Air Force Base that was in the area in World War 2. I understand that it was used by American Bombers.

In the Pukenui area there is turn off to Houhora Heads where there is a Motor Camp, the now vacant Waganer Museum, and a view across to Mt Camel. Around the top of Houhora Harbour is Henderson Bay, with a long stretch of white sand and a DOC motor camp with one occupant. In the west of this area is the Aupouri Forest but in the vicinity are producing Avocado orchards. Thousands of acres of Avocados have recently been planted in this area which will become a major producer in years to come.

This is no longer operating but used to be the northern most Pub in NZ and popular with Tourists, Drovers, and Stock Agents.

Back on to SH10, a left turn was taken on to Karikari Peninsular. This leads to several beautiful remote beaches. Rangiputa is at the entrance to Rangaunu Harbour. There are two motels and very

nice holiday homes. A great fishing area. Karikari Beach, Whatuwhiwhi, and Tokerau Beach are all great beaches in this remote area. Carrington Golf Resort and Winery are worth a visit on a nice day, but it wasn't!

Returning to Coopers Beach just after 5pm it was time for drinks before dinner at the famous Mangonui Fish shop. Sitting out on the deck, over the water, with a heater on, I have never before been offered Battered Hapuka fillets. Yum!

AND THEN COVID STRUCK AGAIN. I was given 2 days to get home!

I decided to continue my tour and come home to Hamilton via the Hokianga and Dargaville.

The trip was via Kaitaia, for petrol, and then turn south at Ahipara. Near Broadwood I had to creep slowly through a mob of cattle on the road being driven by an old time drover on horseback. A nudge from a big cattle beast would not have been good for an MX5. Nothing was moving at Broadwood or Kohukohu.

After 2 hours driving I drove on to the Hokianga Ferry with 10 minutes to spare. A toilet stop was relatively urgent but the ferry crew told me the toilet was locked and I was required to stay in the car. Because of the difficulty in paying the fare, the trip was free. The toilets were open in Rawene! Not far on from Rawene is Opononi and then Omapere where I stopped at a picnic area for lunch. Great views of the Hokianga Heads and the huge sand dunes.

From there it was great driving down through the Waipoua Forest to Dargaville where the town was closed down except for the supermarket where I got supplies for dinner. Heading East towards Whangarei I branched off at Maungatapere to my accommodation at Waipu. This was strange as the Motel was organised by my daughter over the phone and I never met the owners. They were happy to accept payment by internet once I got home.

From Waipu I had an easy drive down the Coast through Waipu Cove, Langs Beach, Mangawhai, and Warkworth to SH1 and on to Hamilton. I have never seen the Southern Motorway with such little traffic

Hopefully this story may encourage others to travel the Far North in better times when we are able. There is much more that could be added to this trip without the restrictions of Covid.




