Mazda has revealed a major push into EVs over the next nine years. And the new models will start arriving as soon as next year, with Mazda embracing full electrification, plug-in hybrid, hybrid and mild-hybrid tech across its entire line-up.

It forms part of what Mazda calls its **Sustainable Zoom-Zoom 2030 roadmap**, with the brand to unveil SKYACTIV Multi-Solution Scalable Architecture next year that will grow to five hybrid models, five plug-in hybrid models and three new pure EVs by 2025.

The next stage will see more products shifted to SKYACTIV Scalable EV Architecture, with the brand promising that "100 per cent of our products will have some level of electrification, and our EV ratio will be 25 per cent by 2030".

The extent of electrification is still unknown for our roadster, but Mazda's official statement says:

"Mazda is seeking to electrify the MX-5 Miata in an effort to have all models feature a form of

electrification by 2030. We will work hard to make it a lightweight, affordable, open two-seater sports car in order to meet the needs of customers."

Although there are electric roadsters on the roads today, the MX-5's lightweight nature has always been a huge part of its appeal, and its handling. The electrification batteries will add weight, so whether the future is hybrid or all-electric, there will surely be an increase in overall weight.

Commentary has been saying 75 percent of Mazda's 2030 lineup will offer hybrid power. It's thought while a combo powertrain adds weight, it wouldn't be as much as going fully electric.

Whatever the case, Mazda may have another opportunity to creatively design a new electric roadster to take the MX-5 further into the future.

They've revived the car before and in almost every case, the improvements have been exactly that – a car that improves on its original intent without losing the thrill and uniqueness of the original design and handling.

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
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#### **28 November 2021**

I dream of a future when international travel restrictions will ease sufficiently for my pilgrimage to this idyllic Italian resort where,

The Kaiaua/Miranda area is a great place for fishing, the beach, hot pools and bird watching. Located nearby is the Pūkorokoro Miranda

Shorebird Centre, open 7 days a week from 9am to 5pm. Here you can learn more about our feathered friends. Back in 2002 in our first year in New Zealand, Peter and I were fortunate to attend a lecture-style-talk with the Glenfield Rotarians (where we lived before moving to Hamilton). The talk was about the various species of bird life who reside here, both temporarily and permanently. You can see 1000s of shorebirds on the tidal flats and shell-banks at Pūkorokoro.

Some species such as the Godwit do an annual migration between New Zealand and the Arctic. Imagine flying all that way on your own steam! What about the slightly less adventurous family members like the South Island Pied Oystercatcher and the Wrybill who merely migrate within New Zealand. Sharing the shoreline are some real home-bodies who only reside in the Miranda area: Pied Stilts, New Zealand Dotterel and Variable Oystercatchers. It's worthwhile visiting this centre – from the





amateur-avian-watchers amongst us to the keenand-earnest-twitchers.

But, I digress – back to a more important topic, we arrived at our lunch stop at the Bayview Hotel at 12h45. By now we were well and truly ready for our "fush and chups" and great times spent in camaraderie chats with many familiar faces, and some new ones too.

The once famed "best fish and chips in New Zealand" spot is at Kaiaua, next door to the hotel. Still some of the fame and tasty goodness surely has rubbed off on the hotel's version of the good

staple pub meal of fish and chips!

You just can't beat the fun and fellowship experience of an MX-5 run! After lunch some of our party made their own way home while the rest travelled in convoy to Hamilton. ## 2022 MAZDA MX-5 ENHANCED HANDLING, FLASHY NEW FINISHING



Mazda is preparing to roll out the 2022 Mazda MX-5 featuring enhanced handling and some flashy new finishes for the iconic two-seater's award-winning design.

It's the carmaker's latest effort to perfect a package that has been engaging drivers for more than three decades with its direct response, ultracrisp shifting, perfectly balanced front-engine, rearwheel drive layout – and a snug interior that puts the driver at one with the car.

There's also Kinematic Posture Control (KPC), a new technology developed exclusively for the

MX-5, which recognises a difference in speeds between the back wheels while cornering, lightly applying the brakes on the inner wheel. This prevents lift, enhancing the characteristics of the MX-5's rear multi-link suspension, and supressing body roll.

This stabilises the car, especially during hard cornering with high G-forces and on rough roads, making the MX-5's already legendary handling that much better while also improving comfort.

New Zealand options are the Roadster GT and the RF Limited, both from \$54,990.
