Leaving Wild Oats, we headed Southeast for Ponatahi, and wound our way through farmland to the western side of Martinborough. the 1970s, the area around Martinborough has developed a thriving viticulture business. There are about thirty vineyards and one brewery within walking distance of the town centre, and it has become a popular weekend venue for Wellingtonians who come out to sample the wine and food from the region.

Here on the outskirts of Martinborough with the temperature now climbing towards the high for the day, the front runners pulled over to let the rest of the group catch up. Then in convoy (led by Sharon and Keith) we cruised into Martinborough, around the famous Square before turning left onto Oxford Street and driving Northeast towards Hinakura.

The town became a borough in 1928 and since



What of our other hobbies?


Well, these comprise other car stuff such as the Jaguar Driver's Club, with our purchase of a Jaguar XK8 in July 2018.


WAIKATO ROADSTERS SURPRIZES

The news that Pukekohe Park Raceway would be closing in 2023 was a real blow to the whole New Zealand petrolhead community, so when Keith Jones floated the idea of a MX-5 club track day there, the spots quickly filled up and 26 cars with their willing drivers assembled!

Playday on Track run fantastic events at Pukekohe and Manfeild regularly, and we were given our own grid for the day. This was brilliant as it meant we all got used to each other's speeds and natural groups soon formed – without being held up by slower cars – or more likely being blitzed by some Flash Harry in his 911 Turbo!

A great variety of vehicles, from Harley's freshly-turbo'd NA to Everard's MX-5 Cup Car and Benny from Garage 5's drift car, there was a real mix of vehicles and drivers and it was great to see where everyone fell. I'm proud to say I am solidly mid-pack!

Pukekohe is old school – you hear it talked about on Supercars broadcasts, with big deals made of the tight tolerances and small runoff areas – but let



me tell you, until you're coming up to the curve onto the front straight in your own car, you don't know the half of it. It feels like the concrete walls close in on you as you approach, and any mistake can be very scary! Don't expect big gravel traps and runoffs like you see at Hampton Downs.

From the main straight there is a quick left-right kink before the tight right hander onto the back straight. Speeds here varied but I personally saw approx. 180km/h, while Adam's NB race car was north of 200km/h there.

At the end of the back straight a right-left complex was added about 10 years ago. This was the scene of a few spins (not naming any names)





during the day, before the tight hairpin and back towards the main straight.

I gained an appreciation for the professionals who race this track with supreme confidence and commitment – and commitment, we all learned, is what Pukekohe rewards! Trusting the car and hanging on through the high speed sections definitely paid off – even if it got the heart rate going a bit!

We had 3 fantastic morning sessions in the dry, with everyone picking up the track and getting faster – a shoutout to Nigel who was quick in his NC from the get-go – before our first session post lunch was very wet – however a brave contingent went out anyway, braving the conditions and in Thomas's 100th Anniversary ND, not afraid of a few spins!!

A fairly serious accident on the back straight from someone driving a Commodore SS reminded us of the very real dangers of even amateur track days (the driver was fine but the car almost certainly a write-off), before it was time for one last session –

in what felt like a typhoon!

The rain was absolutely chucking it down and rivers of water were forming on Pukekohe's soon to be torn up surface. I decided to crawl around in my ND, although aquaplaning at 160kph at the end of the front straight was enough for me to reel it in and cruise round for the last few laps of the day, once or twice testing the grip and getting a little slide going out of the tighter corners.

It was a fantastic day and yet another great way to enjoy our little sportscars – I remarked to Allan as we left how fantastic it is to drive to the track, bash around for the day, and then simply drive home – no fuss, just fun and enjoyment.

An enormous thanks to Keith for organising the day, and to the organisers at Playday on Track who run a fantastic day that's easy to get involved with.

There are still dates at Pukekohe before it closes, and Manfeild too, so check out https://www.playdayontrack.co.nz/.

Saturday dawned a beautiful day as I headed down to Pukekohe for the 2nd round of the Auckland Car Club Gymkhana. I arrived to find 26 cars of various makes and models, including minis, MX-5s (great to see 6 there), 4 wheel drive Imprezas and a couple of classic cars.

After the briefing we walked the 3 morning courses (rather strange to see everyone walking around the cones in the grass paddock). We then split into groups and off we went trying to remember how to navigate the courses correctly, and not go round the cones the wrong way.

TOKOMARU STEAM ENGINE MUSEUM

20 NOVEMBER 2022

Amidst a grey drizzle a small group of cars met in Waikanae behind the town centre. A quiet drive took us up SHW1.

Some of us took our usual inland sideroad through the Waitohu Valley, which is a fun drive

even if the Wet Rags have reduced the speed to 60. Rumour has it that Waka Kotahi wants to reduce the speed through the Remutaka Hill to 60 as well. How boring!

SHW57 took us through Shannon to Tokomaru, just 10 minutes further north, where we met up with other cars from the Wairarapa and Manawatu areas. This small village has had this large collection of steam engines for decades. I recall visiting the museum in the 1980s! It fell into disrepair until it was purchased by

a keen engineer/farmer, Colin. He and his family are bringing it back together with support from the community and it's looking great.

There are so many unique items in the collection, including the oldest (1869) and largest steam engines in NZ. We weren't lucky enough to enjoy the sight of a steam engine being brought up to speed, but Colin showed us an electric model that demonstrates the mechanism. Most people don't realise that steam was used mostly to power farm and forestry equipment (like sawmills) along with the trains we are mostly familiar with.


For me, the highlight is the magical miniature railway display (HO scale, I think), complete with lots of tiny houses, people with their pets, shops, etc. A whole, complex village. And of course, an electric "steam" train running around the tracks. I believe some of it came into the museum's possession recently, as its previous owner had financial difficulties.

The drizzly day persisted, so we enjoyed our picnic lunch indoors, sitting on old railway carriage seats in the main hall. After a wonderful chat, we made our separate ways home. Luckily, there were patches of dry – even sunny – weather so we did get a chance to put the tops down for a bit. Lovely!



of the entrance reflected the two mountains on the horizon between which the sun would rise each day, symbolising rebirth. The garden represented the land of Egypt, celebrating the annual harvest and flooding of the Nile. At the far end of the garden was the temple itself, with its sacred inner sanctum off-limits to all but the highest priests.

The Mansfield Garden represents the early



20th century New Zealand garden described in Katherine Mansfield's short story 'The Garden Party'.

Hamilton Gardens is home to Te Parapara - New Zealand's only traditional Maori productive garden. The garden showcases traditional practices, materials and ceremonies relating to food production and storage, drawn from the knowledge of local Maori which has been passed down the generations.

Under development at Hamilton Gardens is the Pasifika Garden, Medieval Garden and the Baroque Garden.

Hamilton Gardens are an amazing place to visit with forever changing garden themes, open every day of the year and at no cost to the public.
